Jubilee 2025

The Jubilee has its roots in the Jewish tradition, where every 50 years was observed as a year of rest for the land, the restitution of property and the liberation of slaves. In the Catholic Church, the first Jubilee was proclaimed by Pope Boniface VIII, and there have been 27 ordinary Holy Years to date.

The Jubilee of 2025, is themed as 'Pilgrims of Hope'. It officially began on 24th December 2024, with the opening of the Holy Door and it will conclude on 6th January, 2026.

This sacred event gives believers an opportunity to renew their faith through (i) Spiritual journeys (ii) Physical journeys (iii) Plenary indulgences.

A Plenary Indulgence fully erases the earthly consequences of sins, offering a type of 'spiritual cleansing'; however, it is not a forgiveness of sins. A plenary indulgence can be requested for oneself, or on behalf of others - living or deceased.

To obtain a plenary indulgence during the Jubilee Year, one must meet the following criteria:

- **1. Sacramental Confession** Confession must be sincere and complete, accompanied by true repentance.
- **2. Eucharistic Communion** After Confession, we must participate in Holy Mass and receive Communion.
- **3. Pray for the Pope's intention -** Our Father, Hail Mary and Glory be...
- **4. Act of Charity** Visiting the sick, volunteering for a charity, or performing acts of kindness.
- **5. Pilgrimages to Holy Places** (Four in Rome) and the following four in Mumbai and not so far away. (Iholy Name Cathedral, Colaba (ii) Mt. Mary's Basilica, Bandra West (iii) Our Lady of Velankanni, Bhate Uttan (iv) Our Lady of Fatima, Karjat.
- **6. Rejection of sin** having a genuine detachment from sin and living a true Christian life.

If you would like to make this Jubilee Year a fruitful one, make the effort and join a pilgrimage to at least one of these dedicated shrines.

The symbol of the Jubilee Year 2025 is a logo featuring four stylized figures representing humanity from the four corners of the earth, embracing each other and clinging to a cross that is shaped like a sail and ends in an anchor. The logo symbolizes the theme 'Pilgrims of Hope', emphasizing unity, fraternity, and the journey of faith amidst life's challenges.

Symbolism:

Four Figures: Represent all of humanity, coming together from different backgrounds and cultures to find unity in hope.

The Cross: A central symbol of Christian faith, representing sacrifice, redemption, and the hope of salvation.

Sail-shaped Cross: Suggests the cross as a guiding force, like a sail leading a ship through life's challenges and uncertainties.

Anchor: Located at the bottom of the cross, the anchor symbolizes hope, stability, and refuge during life's storms.

Waves: The rough waves beneath the figures represent the difficulties and challenges of life's journey, highlighting the need for hope and faith.





Pope Leo XIV: New Shepherd of the Church

Habemus Papam is Italian for: We have a Pope! This eagerly awaited cry announced that a new Pope had been elected by the College of Cardinals during the recent Papal Conclave, which was convened consequent to the passing away of popular Pope Francis on April 21, 2025

69 year old **Cardinal Robert Francis Prevost** originally from Chicago, USA has been elected as the 267th Pope of the Catholic Church of

more than 1.4 billion members. He is the 1st American Pope in the 2000 year old history of the Catholic Church.

Pope Leo XIV attended Villanova University in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. He graduated in the year 1977 with a Bachelor of Science (BS) degree in mathematics. Pope Leo is known as the Pope of both Americas – he has citizenship of Peru, as he spent more than a decade serving as a missionary, leader of the Augustinian Order and Bishop in Peru. For the past two years, he led the Vatican Office that selects Bishops globally.

Pope Leo XIV is fluent in English, Spanish, Italian, French and Portuguese, and can read Latin and German. His ability to speak multiple languages is seen as an advantage, particularly in his ability to connect with people from different linguistic



backgrounds. He's considered to be as international as American, the best candidate to unify the Church today. When he addressed the audience gathered in St. Peter's Square, it was not in English, but in Italian and Spanish, opening with the words, "Peace be with all of you!"

The Papal name, 'Leo' carries significant weight due to its historical association with strength, leadership, and commitment to social justice. The name 'Leo' means

'lion' in Latin, symbolizing courage and bravery. Specifically, Pope Leo XIV's name choice is seen as a nod to previous popes named Leo, including Leo XIII, who was known for his social justice teachings and his encyclical, Rerum Novarum, which addressed the 'social question' in the context of the industrial revolution. This suggests a continuation of Pope Francis' ministry and a focus on social justice issues.

And in conclusion, an extract of a speech from the New Pope:

"Because this Church, as long as I breathe, will be a home for the homeless, and a rest for the weary.

God doesn't need soldiers.

He needs brothers....And you, yes, you... are one of them."

We bid adieu to two pillars of the church –

Fr. Antony and Fr. Nicky – in June with Royston Braganza succinctly summing up their Ministry for the past few years. As it was Pentecost Sunday, he dwelt on the Holy Spirit, who empowers and guides believers to be His instruments in the world, using His gifts, the Word of God, and the fruit of the Spirit to fulfill His divine purposes. Both fathers have excelled at being instruments of the Holy Spirit, transforming the lives of our parishioners during their tenure here.

He then employed mathematical concepts to describe them:

Fr. Antony was HCD (Highest Common Divisor) – H for Holiness, C for Compassion and D for Deep in reflection, providing insights always.

Fr. Nicky was LCM (Least Common Multiple) – L for Lively (energetic on the sports field and a live wire throughout); C for Creativity oozing from every pore (every homily was different for the children's mass, also homilies on the beach or in the garden for a different setting); M for Meekness, Meticulous and Music, which defines him – he's talented at singing, playing and composing videos.

Fr. Nicky reminisces:

I look at my journey of 10 years at St. Theresa's Church with gratitude, as I have grown and learnt a lot and it's made me what I am today. I had three Parish Priests and many co-pastors in our team – all with their grades, experiences and contributions. During my tenure, I got the opportunity to be Zonal Pastor of all the zones to interact with people. I also had the privilege to be Spiritual Director of some of the Cells and Associations and I am happy that I could contribute in some way. What was important was that we had good teams to plan, organize and implement, in a collaborative manner.

Even COVID-19 could not separate connections with the parishioners. It was a blessing in disguise for me to venture into online learning, and also use my talents of music and media. We learnt to be self-reliant, to reach out to people with online gadgets, and also do things in-house in lockdown.

I go with a bag of memories to cherish from here and express my thanks to God and to all the parishioners for being a great part of my life. We will continue to remain connected.

Fr. Antony reflects:

I've worked in the Congo and Chad on zealous missionary work for 18 years, experienced their abysmal poverty, lack of food, health and education, but they had vibrancy of spirit, faith and traditions, which moved me. My health suffered and I was stricken with liver cancer, so I moved back to India for treatment and had a liver transplant in 2012.

I was delighted to be posted in my first pastoral assignment at St. Theresa's, where I was welcomed with warmth and affection. In a short time, I connected with the parishioners of different ages and varied economic backgrounds and reached out to them, providing spiritual guidance and counselling. I felt accepted, wanted and loved. They all occupy a special place in my heart. As Spiritual Director of many Cells and Associations, I was happy to support and encourage them in their activities. I carry wonderful memories of the time I spent at St. Theresa's and will miss my clergy team and my dear parishioners. By God's grace, my liver is functioning well, but now I've left a small part of my heart in Mumbai.

Legion of Mary Beckons

Started on 26th October, 1956 by Fr. Peter Braun as its first Spiritual Director and Fr. Felix Fonseca as its first President, the Legion of Mary at St. Theresa's has been named as Mary Help of Christians.

Try Your Hand at Home Composting

In the interests of saving the environment, our Care for Creation Cell organized a Home Composting Workshop on 26th April, 2025, in the Parish Council Room. The interactive session was conducted by Joe Rodrigues, an experienced composter with several years of hands-on practice in the field.

Providing several practical tips, Joe demonstrated how to set up a composting bin and guided participants through the do's and don'ts of composting, explaining what food items can be composted and what should be avoided. A key part of the



workshop was learning how to alternate wet and dry layers to prevent fungal growth. Wet materials (greens) include fruit and vegetable scraps, eggshells, feathers, and other organic waste. Dry materials (browns) include dry leaves, wood chips, shredded paper, etc.

He also discussed various composting machines available in the market, including compact electric kitchen composters suited for urban homes. The workshop was well-attended, with 25 participants, including a young lady who travelled all the way from Dadar East! Practical, step-by-step videos were later sent to the attendees. All left, enlightened and eager to experiment composting at home.

Composting Procedure

- 1) Poke holes in the bucket underneath (for drainage) and over the surface at about 60% height (for aeration).
- 2) Place the bucket in a small container, to collect the liquid, called 'compost tea', that drains. This liquid is a good cleaner for the floor and drains, as well as a good fertiliser (dilute it with 10-15 times the amount of water and then water the plants).



3) Prepare 2-3" thick 'bedding' in the bucket, consisting of dry leaves, paper (browns), hay, etc.
4) Put in a layer of kitchen/wet waste

(greens), green leaves, etc. over the bedding, the smaller the pieces the better.

5) To 'kick start': spread 1 cup (150-200 ml) of curd or buttermilk or ready compost over the wet waste.



6) Cover with cocopeat powder (from the coconut husk), dry leaves, (browns) etc.
Suggested ratio of wet waste to dry leaves is 1:2 or 1:3.

7) Cover the top of the bucket with a sheet of cardboard or acrylic.



8) Depending on how much wet waste you generate, repeat the procedure of putting wet waste and covering it with dry waste. Garnish it with

a teaspoon of egg powder.

- 9) Every 2 days, you can take the top cover off and expose the mixture to fresh air and sunlight for an hour.
- 10) Every 3-4 days, churn the mixture, so that it mixes well and also to promote aeration.
- 11) Continue adding waste till the bucket is 90-95% full, then close it and let it stand. However, churning must continue every 3-4 days.



12) Problems/ monitoring:

A. If there's too much liquid in the mixture, it will ferment. Small white worms may also form. If it is smelly or very wet, add cocopeat or dry leaves. If the drip tray gets full, empty the liquid into a bottle or container.

- B. If the mixture is too dry, the process will slow down. Spray some water over it.
- C. Signs of success:
- 1) The bucket will feel warm or hot.
- 2) There will be an earthy smell.
- 3) The level of the mixture reduces to about 60-70%, after about a month.
- 4)Keep churning till the compost is ready. It will be like soft mud.
- 5) When ready, take out the compost and spread it out to dry, for 1-2 days.
- 6) You can use it directly for your plants, or sieve it to get a fine powder to use.
- 7) If you don't need to use it immediately, put it in a plastic packet and store in a cool, dry place.
